#### **NEW BOOKS – DECEMBER 2020**

Code Talker: the first and only memoir by one of the original Navajo code talkers of WWII - Chester Nez. A Navajo marine brought up on the rez and in BIA boarding school, Chester and his Navajo team created a code the Japanese were never able to break during WW II. None spoke of it until the program was declassified in 1968. Photos included.

**Descent into Darkness: Pearl Harbor, 1941, A Navy Diver's Memoir** – Cdr. Edward C. Raymer, USN (Ret.) Just hours after the attack on Pearl Harbor, Raymer and his team of Navy divers began their desperate attempts to save lives and salvage the ships despite the dangers of diving due to less advanced technology.

**Evening Star** – Catherine Coulter. The first book in the Star Quartet. When Alex Saxton wins virgin Giana Van Cleve in the infamous Roman Flower Auction, he never expects to lose his heart . . .

**Going Home** – Nora Roberts. Contains three of her classic tales about three very different women who must rediscover the love of family before they can give their hearts to others.

The Handsome Man's De Luxe Cafe – Alexander McCall Smith. No. 1 Ladies Detective Agency Series. A kindhearted brother and sister have taken in a nameless woman with no memory of her own history or how she came to Botswana. It falls to Precious and her new co-director to discover the woman's identity.

**Home Free** – Fern Michaels. The Sisterhood, seven spunky women who fight for truth and justice, form the top secret CIC which officially won't exist but they report directly to the president.

**Magic Hour** – Kristin Hannah. A child psychiatrist works with a six-year old girl who emerged from Olympic National Forest mute, alone, and no hints to her past.

**Outfox** – Sandra Brown. After a thirty-year search for a serial killer, FBI agent Drex Easton becomes a suspect's next-door neighbor but can he navigate a series of twists and turns to track down the truth?

**The Postcard** – Beverly Lewis. The story of a weary big-city journalist and a New Order Amish woman whose lives come together over a mysterious postcard.

**Trail of Broken Wings** – Sejal Badani. With their father in a coma, three estranged sisters, including Indian American photographer Sonya, come together while buried secrets of racism and violence rise to the surface.

**The Zookeeper's Wife:** A War Story – Diane Ackerman. The true story of two Polish zookeepers in Warsaw who saved over 300 people from the Nazis by hiding them in the empty animal cages and giving them animal names.
