NEW BOOKS – MARCH 2021

Agent Sonya: Moscow's Most Daring Wartime Spy by Ben Macintyre. A page-turning history of a legendary secret agent, a woman who influenced the course of the Cold War and helped plunge the world into a decades-long standoff between nuclear superpowers.

Benjamin Franklin's Bastard: A Novel by Sally Cabot. Historical fiction of the story of Benjamin Franklin and his bastard son, and the mistress and wife who loved them both.

Finding Meaning: The Sixth Stage of Grief by David Kessler who journeys both personally and professionally beyond the classic five stages to a sixth: meaning.

Fire and Ice by J.C. Jance. LP. Two cases - one in Seattle, the other in the Arizona desert - draw Investigator J.P. Beaumont and Sheriff Joanna Brady together by the hour in Arizona. Sparks flew the last time they joined forces.

The Griffin & Sabine Trilogy by Nick Bantock. Part romance, part mystery, and a work of art including letters in envelopes, postcards, and other delights.

Irish Eyes: A Callahan Garrity Mystery (#8 of 8) by Mary Kay Andrews LP Callahan, a former Atlanta cop, and her cleaning crew pierce the veil of secrecy surrounding an Irish police organization.

The Mountains Wild (#1 of 2) by Sarah Taylor. Set in Dublin and NYC, homicide detective Maggie D'arcy tackles the 23-year mystery disappearance of her cousin when new evidence emerges.

The Night Portrait: A Novel of World War II and Da Vinci's Italy. Laura Morelli's dual-timeline historical novel about the creation of da Vinci's *Portrait of a Lady with an Ermine* and the woman who fought to save it from Nazi destruction during WWII.

The Skull Mantra (Inspector Shan Tau Yun #1 of 8) by Eliot Pattison. Inspector Yun, a prisoner deported to Tibet for offending someone high up in Beijing's power structure, is released to solve a murder and pulled into the Tibetan people's desperate fight for its sacred mountains and the Chinese regime's blood-soaked policies.

No Stopping Us Now: The Adventures of Older Women in American History by Gail Collins. A lively social history of American women that illustrates the ways in which age is an arbitrary concept that has swung back and forth over the centuries.

Women at Michigan: The "Dangerous" Experiment, 1870s to the Present by Ruth Bordin. Chronicles the changing status of women students, faculty and staff.
