NEW BOOKS – JUNE 2020

- **The Big Bad Wolf** by James Patterson. An Alex Cross thriller about kidnapped people who are bought and sold by the predator known only as Wolf.

- **The Caves of Perigord: A Novel** by Martin Walker. An historical thriller that brings to life the creation of an extraordinary work of prehistoric cave art and the struggle to possess it in our own time.

- **The Death of Socrates: Hero, Villain, Chatterbox, Saint** by Emily Wilson who offers a comprehensive look at the trial and death of Socrates as both a historical event and a controversial cultural ideal.

- **The Elephant Whisperer:** My Life with the Herd in the African Wild by Lawrence Anthony who after taking in a herd of rogue elephants in order to save them, became a part of their family; a heartwarming, exciting, funny, and sometimes sad memoir.

- **The Fifties**. A sweeping social, political, economic, and cultural history of the ten years that author David Halberstam regards as seminal in determining what our nation is today.

- **The Lovestory of Missy Charmichael** by Beth Morrey. A coming-of-old story about a lonely woman but filled with wry laughter and deep insights with the help of a rambuctious mutt-on-loan.

- *An Odyssey: A Father, a Son, and an Epic* by Daniel Mendelsohn. Eighty-one year old Jay Mendelsohn enrolls in the undergraduate *Odysses* seminar his son teaches which leads to a father and son's transformative journey in reading--and reliving--Homer's epic masterpiece.

- **One Amber Bead** a novel by Michigan author Rebecca Thaddeus about two Polish cousins – one an immigrant's daughter in Chicago, the other witnessing the World War II devastation of her country - and their relationship with one another.

- **The Other Wes Moore: One Name, Two Fates** by Wes Moore. Explores how two fatherless boys in Baltimore with the same name, age, neighborhood, and police run-ins grew up when one became a Rhodes Scholar and White House Fellow while the other ended up in jail.

- *The Rise and Fall of the Dinosaurs: A New History of Their Lost World* by NYT Bestseller author Steve Brusatte, a foremost paleontologist, who tells the complete, surprising, and new history of the dinosaurs. Includes stories of his expeditions, pics, maps, and family trees.

- *Small Great Things* by Jodi Picoult who explores race, privilege, prejudice, justice, and compassion when her African-American delivery nurse faces a moral dilemma.

- A World Lit Only by Fire: The Medieval Mind and the Renaissance - Portrait of an Age by William Manchester. The preeminent popular history of Europe's rebirth after the Dark Ages.

- **The Zookeepers' War: An Incredible True Story from the Cold War** by J.W. Mohnhaup. The fascinating true story of the Cold War's strangest proxy war fought between the zoos on either side of the Berlin Wall.
