#### **NEW BOOKS - NOVEMBER 2022**

~The Big Lie: Election Chaos, Political Opportunism, and the State of American Politics after 2020 by journalist Jonathan Lemire who explores the roots of "the Big Lie" to understand how it has become a fixture of political life. ~The Collaborator - Diane Armstrong. Budapest, 1944: Jewish journalist Miklos risks his life to save Jews from the death camps. Sydney, 2005: Annika journeys to Budapest & Tel Aviv to learn about the man who rescued her grandmother. ~Holidays with the Wongs: The Complete Series by Jackie Lau. Four holiday (including Thanksgiving) romance novellas about the Wong siblings. ~A Hundred Sweet Promises by Sepehr Haddad. Based on the true story of his grandfather, a famed Persian composer who, on the eve of WW I, went to Russia to study music and fell in forbidden love with a Romanov princess. ~Judy, A Dog in Million: From Runaway Puppy to the World's Most Heroic **Dog** by Damien Lewis. The mascot of two Royal Navy gunboats became Japanese prisoner of war #'81-Medan. She dragged survivors from a torpedoed ship, scavenged food for her starving fellow inmates, and received an award. ~The Matriarch: Barbara Bush and the Making of an American Dynasty by journalist Susan Page. Explores Barbara Bush's accomplishments, struggles, and contributions as a unique and influential women in American history. ~Never by Ken Follett. Struggling to prevent the outbreak of a world war are a young woman intelligence officer; a spy working undercover with jihadists; a Chinese spymaster; and President Pauline Green beleaguered by a populist rival for the next president election. ~The Sewing Girl's Tale: A Story of Crime and Consequences in Revolutionary America by historian John Sweet. In 1793 17-year-old Lanah Sawyer charged a gentleman with rape, unheard of in the day. The case drew top lawyers, including Alexander Hamilton, and shaped the development of American law. Eventually she won the case. Includes photographs. ~The Splendid and the Vile: A Sage of Churchil, Family, and Defiance During the Blitz (LP) by Erik Larson. A top favorite All Read book. Drawing on diaries, documents, and once-secret intelligence reports, Larson provides the day-to-day experience of Churchill and his family during London's darkest year. ~The Spy and the Traitor: The Greatest Espionage Story of the Cold War (LP) by Ben Macintyre. Oleg Gordievsky, famous double agent senior KGB officer, was uncovered by CIA double agent Aldrich Ames who tipped Russian officials off; a baby's diaper enabled him to escape to freedom, a rare feat. ~Teacher Man by Frank McCourt. Tells how his 30-yr. teaching career shaped his second act as a writer. A tribute to his ability to tell a great story as, 5 days a week, 5 periods per day, he worked to gain the attention and respect of unruly, hormonally charged or indifferent adolescents. The 3rd in his memoir series. **The Witch Elm** by Tana French. While recuperating from being beaten up by burglers, Toby moves in to take care of his dying uncle. A skull is found in the trunk of a garden elm tree. As detectives close in, Toby must face his past.
