

NEW BOOKS – FEBRUARY 2022

Resident Pick. Lois P. recommended the following book.

The Best Laid Plans by Terry Fallis. Engineering professor Angus, willing to do anything to avoid teaching English to engineers, agrees to run for an office he is certain to lose. Scandal eliminates his opponent so to his horror, Angus is elected. He decides to see what good an honest M.P., who doesn't care about being re-elected, can do in Parliament. Results are hilarious.

Elinor & Shakespeare by Gerald Sindell. In 1593, when the plague closed London theaters, Shakespeare headed north with a company of actors. Also leaving was Elinor Sneshell, a barber-surgeon, to learn what caused the plague to spread. Their paths cross, love ensues, are favored by Scots King James the VI, and again when King of England.

How to Get Rid of a President: History's Guide to Removing Unpopular, Unable or Unfit Chief Executives by David Priess. A political history of the schemes, plots, maneuvers, and conspiracies that have attempted, successfully and not, to remove unwanted presidents.

The Love of My Life by Rosie Walsh. (NYT Bestseller) Obit writer Leo is married to well-known marine biologist Emma who suffers a serious illness. Leo copes by researching and writing about his wife's life but discovers the woman he loves doesn't really exist.

Master Slave Husband Wife: An Epic Journey from Slavery to Freedom by Ilon Woo. (NYT Bestseller) The remarkable true story of Ellen and William Craft who escaped slavery through daring, determination, and disguise, with Ellen passing as a wealthy, disabled White man and William posing as "his" slave.

The Only Plane in the Sky: An Oral History of 9/11 by Garrett Graff. (NYT Bestseller) The story of the day in the words of those who lived it. Draws on never-before-published transcripts, declassified documents, original interviews, and oral histories from nearly 500 government officials, first responders, witnesses, survivors, friends, and family members.

Out of Nowhere by Sandra Brown. Young mother Elle and high-rolling consultant Calder collide at the police station following a shooter opening fire into the crowd at a Texas county fair. Culminates in a desperate manhunt that will change their futures forever.

How to Know a Person: The Art of Seeing Others Deeply and Begin Deeply Seen (LP) by David Brooks. (NYT Bestseller) Guide to the art of truly knowing another person in order to foster deeper connections at home, work, and throughout life. Draws on psychology, neuroscience, theater, philosophy, history, & education to present an integrated approach to human connection.

Savannah Sleuth by Alan Chaput. Savannah socialite Patricia's mother, a prominent philanthropist, drops dead leaving police baffled by her untimely death. Patricia and 3 friends investigate what she believes is murder. A journey from Southern wealth, hidden corners of Savannah, and across two continents in a deadly pursuit of justice.

Three Things About Elsie by Joanna Cannon. 84-year-old Florence, with 2 loyal friends, is determined, despite dementia setting in, to find out why the newest resident, a man who looks and acts like someone she was glad to see die sixty years ago, has resurfaced.
