NEW BOOKS - JUNE 2025

Crow Talk by Eileen Garvin. Ornithologist Frankie, musician/instructor Anne, and her 5-year-old autistic son Aiden meet on a Northwest lake emptying of summer residents and begin forming friendships while rescuing a baby crow. Their back stories unfold of family, struggle and salvation enhanced by parallels to the world of birds and the healing power of nature.

The First Desire by Nancy Reisman. Rebecca, wife of Jewish jewelry store owner Abe, has died leaving five adult children in late 1920s Buffalo. Goldie, the eldest, disappears leaving married Sadie to cope with tyrannical father and difficult siblings. Finally in 1950 a new family crisis brings Goldie home. Each chapter is the point of view of a single character.

First Lie Wins (LP) by Ashley Elston. NYT Bestseller. Evie Porter has everything a nice Southern girl could want: boyfriend, house with picket fence, friends but Evie doesn't exist -it's an identity supplied by her mysterious boss, Mr. Smith. The mark is Ryan. The job, one in a series, is complicated because she has feelings for the mark: Ryan. A cat and mouse thriller.

I Am Bunny: How a "Talking" Dog Taught Me Everything I Need to Know About Being Human by Alexis Devine. The story of Bunny, the "talking" sheepadoodle, and her human friend, Alexis, as well as a history of animal cognition and communication. Alexis shares details of her life that inform her relationship to Bunny. Interspersed with great photographs.

Inheritance: A Memoir of Genealogy, Paternity, and Love by Dani Shapiro. NYT Bestseller. A memoir about her family's secret uncovered by a genealogy test. Explores the ethical questions surrounding fertility treatments and DNA testing, and paternity, identity, and love.

Martyr! by Kaveh Akbar. NYT Bestseller. A newly sober, orphaned son of Iranian immigrants, guided by the voices of artists, poets and kings, embarks on a search for a family secret that leads him to a terminally ill painter and a painting in the Brooklyn Museum that suggests his mother may not have been who or what she seemed. Funny and wholly original.

The Mighty Red by Louise Erdrich. NYT Bestseller. Crystal trucks sugar-beets, her live-in runs off with the church renovation fund, and teen daughter Kismet marries Gary who she doesn't love while Hugo is determined to steal her love. Describes how sugar-beet farmers in eastern North Dakota have destroyed fertile prairie through overuse and chemical herbicide.

My Name is Emilia Del Valle (LP) by Isabel Allende. A historical novel running from Mission District San Francisco to Chile. Emilia, the result of a one night stand but raised by a loving stepfather, is a modern woman who journeys as a reporter with fellow friend and reporter, Eric, to Chile to cover the 1891 Civil War and to discreetly uncover the truth about her father.

Nine Lives: My Time as MI6's Top Spy Inside al-Qaeda by Aimen Dean. Young Muslim Aimen, determined to defend his faith, found himself fighting on the wrong side and decided to work undercover for MI6. As an al-Qaeda bomb-maker, he rubbed shoulders with the 9/11 master- minds. As a double agent often brushing with death, he was called the spy with 9 lives.

The Only True Genius in the Family by Jennie Nash. Claire is a successful commercial food photographer, daughter of a renowned nature photographer who just died in a skiing accident, and mother of a rising star artist close to her grandfather. Explores their family dynamic, is creativity genetic or learned, and different approaches to photography and painting.

A Tap on the Window by Linwood Barclay. When driving home one night, a rain-drenched girl taps on private investigator Cal's car window and asks for a ride. Drawn into a nightmare of secrets, lies, and cover-ups in his small upstate NY town, he knows truth is the only thing that can save him. He's about to expose the town's secrets one by one - if he lives long enough.
