NEW BOOKS - AUGUST 2022

Arctic Bush Pilot: From Navy Combat to Flying Alaska's Northern Wilderness: A Memoir by James Anderson who pioneered post-WWII Alaska polar bush service; flew everyone including medical emergencies and everything. Historical photos.

The Boardwalk Bookshop by Susan Mallery. Fate brings three strangers together who become family, giving each other courage to start over. A great summer read.

Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants by Robin Kimmerer. A Native American distinguished environmental biologist offers her perspective on how to face our environmental challenges through restoration of ecological communities and our relationship to the land.

Cokie: A Life Well Lived (LP) by Steven Roberts. A loving tribute of Cokie Roberts – daughter, wife, mother, journalist, advocate, historian - by her journalist husband who tells stories about this well-known woman.

The Elephant Mountain Gang: Mystery at Maine's Moosehead Lake (LP) by Tommy Carbone who combines historical fiction with mystery and vivid descriptions of the Maine forest, wildlife, and Maine's largest lake.

The Hidden Brain: How Our Unconscious Minds Elect Presidents, Control Markets, Wage Wars, and Save Our Lives by Shankar Vedantam. Through dramatic storytelling, fascinating characters, and cutting-edge science, Vedantam explores the secrets our brains keep from us—and how they are revealed. An NPR host.

The Light Beyond: Explorations into the Afterlife by Raymond Moody. A pioneer in the field of near-death studies, he explores the research of his peers and offers answers and peace of mind to those who wonder about a world beyond.

Long Time No See by Susan Isaacs. Former housewife, current widow, and local history professor, Judith offers her services to the prime suspect, son of mob boss Fancy Phil, in a woman's murder. He turns her down but Phil has other plans.

Mudlark: In Search of London's Past Along the River Thames by Lara Maiklem. A forager along the Thames, her interest lies in objects that hold mysteries/human stories which she researches/preserves. Fascinating entre to British social history.

Ranger Confidential: Living, Working, and Dying in the National Parks by Andrea Lankford. A graphic yet funny account of a twelve-year veteran protecting the park from the people, the people from the park, and the people from each other.

The Swerve: How the World Became Modern by Stephen Greenblatt. A mystery-in-the-archives page turner relates the story of the rediscovery of a manuscript in 1417 gone missing for a 1,000 years and its impact on Galileo, Freud, Darwin, Jefferson, and Einstein.

A Week at the Shore by Barbara Delinsky. Three sisters reunite at their family Rhode Island beach house but going home is fraught with memories, mysteries, and secrets. During 7 days they test the bonds of sisterhood, friendship, and family. Series/Prolific Author – Baldacci – The Winner
