NEW BOOKS – SEPTEMBER 2022

Armored (LP) by Mark Greaney. Enter the world of an elite professional bodyguard from Lebanon, where he lost a lower leg saving his primary, to life in the mall cop slow lane, to a dangerous UN peace mission with a Mexican drug cartel.

Caught (LP) by Harlan Coben. A missing girl, the community stunned by her loss, the predator who may have taken her, and the reporter who suddenly realizes she can't trust her own instincts about this story or the motives of the people around her.

Death on a Galician Shore by Domingo Villar. Detective Inspector Leo Caldas is called in to an apparent suicide on the northwest coast of Spain but soon details turn the case into a complex murder investigation. A chilling story of violence, blackmail and revenge.

The Diamond Eye (LP) by Kate Quinn. A WWII tale of a quiet Ukrainian librarian and mother who becomes history's deadliest female sniper, a lethal hunter of Nazis, known as Lady of Death. During a goodwill tour to America, she is befriended by Eleanor Roosevelt. Based on a true story.

Family Reunion by Nancy Thayer. A longtime Nantucket resident is trying to make the best of a lonely summer. Her spirited granddaughter is learning what she wants out of life. Unforgettable surprises await them both in this multigenerational novel.

Into the Beautiful North by Luis Urrea. Young Nayeli works at a taco shop in her Mexican village and realizes all the men left to go north. After watching *The Magnificent Seven*, she goes north to recruit 7 men to return and protect the village from bandidos who plan on taking it over.

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig. Between life and death there is a library. When Nora arrives in misery and full of regrets, each book enables her to live as if she had done things differently. She must decide what is truly fulfilling in life and makes life worth living.

The Paris Apartment by Lucy Foley. Jess, needing a fresh start, moves into her half-brother's very nice Paris apartment only to find him disappeared. Every resident has something to hide and knows something they're not telling Jess as she digs into her brother's situation.

Roger's Version by John Updike. Middle-aged professor of divinity Roger and young computer scientist Dale engage in a theological-scientific debate spiced up by Roger's young wife ending up in Dale's bed. An allegory of faith and reason that ends also as a black comedy of revenge.

'Tis by Frank McCourt. Continuing his memoir beginning with *Angela's Ashes*, McCourt relates leaving Ireland at 19 for New York and the life he lived as an army draftee, dock worker, university student despite leaving school at 14, and finally as a teacher and writer.

Whacking Jimmy by William Wolf. Ordinary college student Bobby Tucci had steered clear of the family business when his dying Detroit mob boss grandfather promises him \$40 million if he'll stay around for a while. But there's a complication: prove himself to the Family by killing Jimmy Hoffa. A hilarious thriller and classic caper about one of the greatest unsolved crimes in history.
